THE POWER OF PRAYER

WILL GRAHAM ON PEARL GOODE AND THE POWER OF PRAYER

In the annals of world history, you won't find many mentions of a lady named Pearl Goode. She never ran for political office, never commanded troops, and never served as the CEO of a Fortune-500 company.

Pearl Goode was a widowed nurse in her mid-60s, living in Pasadena, California, in 1949 when a young evangelist came to hold tent meetings in Los Angeles at the corner of Washington and Hill streets.

The very first night of the Crusade, she watched the fiery preacher Billy Graham and his team share the Gospel. As Pearl later recounted in an interview, "That night God laid those boys on my heart as a burden."

Pearl Goode traveled to dozens of Billy Graham's Crusades and prayed during each event.

Pearl then joined the volunteer prayer team for the Greater Los Angeles Crusade and was a part of seeing the campaign extended from three weeks to eight weeks, with people cramming into the tent every night to hear the Good News. After that early Crusade, Pearl became a prayer warrior for the Crusades, without anybody on my grandfather's team even knowing. She would spend her own money to travel by Greyhound bus to wherever they were holding an event, quietly check herself into a motel near the venue, and immediately begin praying. Pearl estimated that she covered 48,000 miles by bus, simply to pray for the Crusades.

Even later in life when Pearl could no longer travel, or when my grandfather was preaching overseas, she would make it a point to know exactly when he would be preaching, and she would spend those exact hours in prayer.

In an address he gave in 1994, Billy Graham said, "She prayed all night many nights, and I could sense the presence and power of that prayer. When she died, I felt it."

We must never underestimate the power of the prayer that is lifted up by wonderful saints like Pearl all around the world. Prayer/talking to God is of paramount importance in developing our relationship with our Savior and in building up and supporting others through the work of the Holy Spirit. The great significance of prayer is, I believe, why we see so many calls to prayer in the New Testament.

How many of us actually make the time to become a prayer warrior like Pearl Goode? She would use her own money to travel to faraway states, only to lock herself in a motel room and pray all night long. What a challenge to the rest of us who can't find 15 minutes in a day to spend with our Lord!

What made you want to become an elder? A call and a need

from the elders

THE LORD'S DAY

Was it COVID or wasn't it? I really don't know. I didn't take the test because it felt just like any other cold that I've ever had. To be on the safe side and not expose any of you to whatever it was, I stayed home from church on that particular Sunday. Let me tell you, in all sincerity, I really missed it. I really look forward to coming to church on Sunday, the LORD's day, the Sabbath. On this occasion, I paused to think about what it really means to ""Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy." As it says in Exodus 20:8

Having recently finished the book of Nehemiah, I thought about his reaction to finding the people of God "profaning" the Sabbath. We read in 13:17 "Then I confronted the nobles of Judah and said to them, "What is this evil thing that you are doing, profaning the Sabbath day? Did not your fathers act in this way, and did not our God bring all this disaster on us and on this city? Now you are bringing more wrath on Israel by profaning the Sabbath." How were they profaning the Sabbath? By doing everything but devoting themselves to God and "entering into His rest".

Isaiah describes the proper behavior of God's people on the Sabbath in chapter 58:13-14:

"If you turn back your foot from the Sabbath, from doing your pleasure on my holy day,

and call the Sabbath a delight

and the holy day of the Lord honorable; if you honor it, not going your own ways,

or seeking your own pleasure, or talking idly; then you shall take delight in the Lord,

and I will make you ride on the heights of the earth;

I will feed you with the heritage of Jacob your father,

for the mouth of the Lord has spoken."

And in Ezekiel 20:12-13:

"Moreover, I gave them my Sabbaths, as a sign between me and them, that they might know that I am the Lord who sanctifies them." Some may think that these things, or the Sabbath itself, is Old Testament stuff so it really doesn't apply. After careful thought and some external reading, I reaffirmed what I knew to be true, that it does apply and it matters. I also realized that there is no other institution of worship that is specifically mentioned in the Ten Commandments. This truth was central to the Puritan consideration of worship.

In the book titled "Following God Fully" by Joel R. Beeke and Michael Reeves we read, "William Gouge (1575–1653) said that the Sabbath is part of God's moral law, that is 'a rule of life' that binds all persons, in all places, at all times.' We can see that this is so because God set apart the day as a holy day of rest at creation, when Adam represented all mankind before God, being the father of all nations, Jews and Gentiles (Gen 2:2-3). To be sure, the Jewish Sabbath had its legal peculiarities, but these faded away after Christ finished His redeeming work. However, Christ's taking of the Sabbath under His lordship (Mark 2:28), the church's observance of worship on the first day of the week (Acts 20:7; 1Cor. 16:2), and the explicit reference to 'the LORD's day' (Rev. 1:10) convinced the Puritans that setting apart the first day of the week exclusively for worshipping God was part of God's unchanging moral law and continues as the Christian Sabbath."

I apologize for the long excerpt, but I think it really drives the point home. The God of the Old Testament, the Lord of Ezekiel 20, is none other than Jesus who said to the Pharisees in Mark 2:27-28 "The Sabbath was made for man. not man for the Sabbath. So the Son of Man is lord even of the Sabbath." Jesus is indeed the Lord who sanctifies. The Puritans revered the Lord's day by committing the day to "works of piety" which began with public worship. They prepared for public worship by carefully considering how to dress, both physically (their bodies) and by dressing their souls through spiritual preparation before entering the meeting house. They were instructed to "take heed therefore how ye hear" the message.

I love coming to church on Sundays, but as important as the public meeting/the church service is to us, or was to the Puritans, the whole day was devoted "unto the Lord". It seems to me I have much to learn from our Puritan brothers and sisters and I am humbled to think of how I may be "profaning" the Sabbath, especially in light of George Swinnock's statement about how the Puritans should spend their Sabbath: "Reader, as thy duty is to rest the whole day from wickedness and worldly work, so also to employ the whole day in God's worship, be either praying, or reading, or hearing, or singing, or meditating, or discoursing with others about the works or word of God." Though our devotion should not be such that it precludes works of genuine mercy and help for those in need on the sabbath.

The benefits of keeping the Lord's day holy cannot be measured. At one time the impact could be seen and experienced throughout England and the US. Perhaps some of you remember a time when retail stores were closed on Sundays, businesses all shut down, activities were actually scheduled on other days, and the pace of life on Sundays was generally slower and much more laid back. This phenomenon was a direct result of the Puritan's reverence for the Lord's Sabbath.

We must also realize that though they believed the keeping of the Sabbath was mandated by divine law, the Puritans viewed it as "more of a delight than a duty, and more of an opportunity than merely an obligation." Honestly, when I think of devoting the whole day to this kind of attentiveness to God and worshipping him, I mean, a whole day, completely, the selfishness in me rears its ugly head and I resist. But, let's face it, we, as believers, will be spending an eternity JOYFULLY worshipping our God and Savior and at that time to think anything else could interfere will not even be worthy of the slightest consideration and far removed from our own conscious thought.

If this seems a bit extreme, it's because it is to us, the modern American Christian. I urge us all, myself primarily, let us not be the ground where thorns grew up and kept the seed from growing and producing fruit as in the parable of the Sower. I need to truly recognize God for who he is, just as the puritans did. Maybe I take it in baby steps and just make our church service a priority in my life by being there every chance I have, by dressing appropriately both physically and spiritually, by preparing beforehand, praying for our pastor, our members and our visitors and finally doing my best to be there on time ready to worship my God, the creator and sustainer of all that exists, both visible and invisible. That would be a good place to start and I will write more on this in subsequent l have written this articles. as an encouragement, food for thought, and perhaps even a bit of an admonishment should you feel the same conviction I have felt as I was reminded of what I've actually been missing on Sundays. Romans 12:1-2 says, "I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect." And Hebrews 10:23-25, "Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful. 24 And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, 25 not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near."

My true brothers and sisters, every day that passes is a day nearer our reunion with our God and Savior. I know our brother Dave preached on not being anxious a couple of weeks ago, but let our Lord find us anxiously awaiting His very soon arrival! Come quickly Lord Jesus!



TRUSTING GOD by Jerry Bridges

I have read many of Jerry Bridges' books over the years and have appreciated each one of them. He has the ability to take weighty subject matters and make them easier to understand. Bridges also writes with a Shepherd's heart. His compassion for the hurting comes through while tackling the most challenging of themes. "Trusting God" is no different and may just be my favorite of the over 20 books he's authored.

My plan this month had been to review a different book. Realizing that I had recommended "Trusting God" to four people in the past few weeks, it seemed right to change directions. Many are weary and experiencing difficulties. Even the atmosphere of our country feels heavy to me. As Christians, we need to know that God is wholly in control and worthy of all our trust even through the hardest of circumstances.



Bridge's confidence in God is contagious as he can't help but pour out Scripture page after page. His writing is impactful and energizing. Having gone through a good deal of suffering in his own life, he took on the huge task of topically studying God's sovereignty throughout the Bible. "Trusting God" is the in-depth result of what he learned - not only about God's sovereignty, but His wisdom, love and goodness.

Though "Trusting God" will most certainly help the hurting, my biggest encouragement is to get this book before sorrow comes. Soak in these biblical doctrines and the attributes of God until they are deep within your heart and mind. Bridges says,

"If we are to honor God by trusting Him, and if we are to find peace for ourselves, we must come to the place where we can honestly say, 'God, I do not have to understand. I will just trust'."






PICKLEBALL FUN

global missions

UGANDA Mama Gail

FCC's missionary partner, Mike Evans, of TLI, and a small group set out for the Pastoral Training Center in Uganda. Peter & Gail Bergeson, FCC members, were part of this team. Peter served as one of the main Pastoral teachers during the quarterly session and Gail accompanied the team to spend time in various ministries supporting the women. Showing her honor, they lovingly called her "Mama Gail". Mama Gail was able to listen to their life experiences, was asked for advice and offered prayer. Gail shares her experience with us:


Someone asked me "Why did you decide to go to Uganda?" The first reason was, "Mike Evans asked Peter to invite me". My response was: "Oh my!" As I couldn't come up with a reason to not go, even in prayer, I submitted my body to the immunization requirements—no small feat, as I have a life long aversion to needles. As some of my prayer warriors know, I "suddenly" experienced a neck/back issue for the first time in my life that required chiropractic care and a trip to the emergency room. I can't help but think that there were "spiritual forces of evil in heavenly realms" (Eph. 6:12) at work in the weeks prior to our leaving. The fact that it would be a long journey to Abaana's Hope was quite concerning to me. Our Great Physician did not fail. I had no physical issues.

What a privilege it was to watch, listen and join our sisters in the Lord as they faithfully serve Him. (Also, on this trip was Moriah Evans —Mike's daughter—and her friend, Carly Jones, a high school senior from Wyoming.) We were invited to participate in childcare, the Life Beads program, also eat with the students and staff, employees of the programs.

The childcare program, during our visit was staffed for children of the workers (school was not in session). Babies do not wear diapers; we were warned. Children will create toys out of what is available; one day a group of boys (4 - 8years) found baby birds and created a new home out of an inverted duplo. Shucking peanuts from shells was the activity for the workers while the toddlers wandered between the adults.

Sleeping babies lay on a mat with a sleeping elderly lady. (We, along with ladies from the church, visited her hut one afternoon; they shared Bible verses, sang and prayed for her health issues as well as her family.) In their culture, there are no orphans. Extended family or others in the community will raise the children who have lost their parents. One older women I met is raising 8 children. When a baby is born, the grandparents name the baby. During the years of great persecution by the LRA, the baby names in Acholi were "hate" "death" or something similarly dark. While they continue to have an Acholi name (more positive), there is also an English name -which was very helpful for an American.

I spent some time with the director, Pamela, of the Life Beads ministry. They have a wall of pictures of the women who create the beads. (around 36, I think). She shared stories about the women; some have Muslim husbands, some are single moms. In one situation, the husband brought a 2nd wife to their home. (Both work at Life Beads.) Thanks to the 1st wife's income from Life Beads, she was able to purchase some land and care for her family on her own. As you can imagine, Pamela not only must administer the business but also serve as counselor/mentor for the ladies while caring for her own family.



global missions

There were 2 women's Bible studies; one is taught by the American missionary, Jessica. We attended her study; she taught Ephesians 1 with a translator. (Great teacher) The afternoon study is led by Kevin (a woman staff member) She invited me to share what God has been teaching me. I chose John 15 in which God is described as the gardener, Jesus the vine and we are the branches designed to bear fruit. As in our gardens, the garden is a reflection of the work of the Gardener. You can imagine how small I felt, as the ladies talked of sharing what they had with others, being patient with one another, trusting God more when asked what God was saying to them. Kevin was my translator; my guess is that she improved my little talk!!

While I could write more...allow me to teach you a little Acholi. (The ladies worked very hard to help me speak a greeting.) "Itye maber?" (How are you?) "Atye maber" (I am doing great/fine). I look forward to someday, bowing and singing with those dear Acholi sisters before the throne of our Savior. (Revelation 7: 9-12)



Our ministry supported Ofu Loso men, continue to bring the Gospel teachings of the TLI materials to other leaders that have a desire to know God and teach His Word; and live in the refugee settlements of Boroli, Elema, Maaji, and Pagrinya.

The Bibles in their native languages that were purchased and sent have been a treasure to the men receiving them so they may study and share with others.

Please keep one of the leaders of Ofu Loso, Chandiga Paranza, and his family in your prayers. Their son, Okuga Louis, drowned. In Achouli culture, Okuga Louis's life is shared in this way:

Pastor Jacob's family and a small ministry team endeavored to bring boys and girls and their families a message they had never heard before – the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The 35 mile walk from the nearest town, meant navigating a steep footpath alongside a cliff, crossing 3 rivers, and eventually carrying boxes on their heads and hanging onto tree roots for support to reach a Filipino community nestled in the mountain forest. The motorbike would tip over 15 times every half mile because of the weight of the cartons. The team rejoiced to make their final ascent into the village!

They quickly gathered the children together for an outreach event to explain why they had come. Using colorful posters from Samaritan's Purse, his wife and daughter presented the Gospel to the children in a way they could understand, while at the same time, Pastor Jacob shared a similar message of Good News with the parents. Each child received The Greatest Gift Gospel pamphlet in their language with their shoebox gift. After a countdown, the boys and girls tore into their shoebox gifts with excitement, the fun items inside reinforcing to little hearts how much God loved them.

The next day, Pastor Jacob and his wife invited the children to participate in The Greatest Journey follow-up discipleship program. As they shared the Bible lessons, the boys and girls learned to follow the God they had just heard about and even share His Son, Jesus Christ, with others. The children completed all 12 lessons and graduated from The Greatest Journey, relaying their Scripture memory verses to their neighbors who had come to watch the ceremony. The Good News spread to more and more people throughout their community, drawing many to saving faith in Jesus Christ!

Four years ago, a 9-year-old girl in the Middle East received a shoebox gift, complete with items that quickly became her favorites: a stuffed bird and The Greatest Gift Gospel storybook. God stirred her heart as she read the stories, and she soon enrolled in discipleship classes through her church.

"After hearing the story of the cross and how Jesus died for me, I gave my life to Christ," she said. "I trusted Him fully."

Recently, she gathered 13 of her friends on the street and began teaching them the discipleship lessons she had learned. As a result, six of these boys and girls accepted Christ as their Lord and Savior.




